





September 17, 1996 will forever be etched in the memory of Paulette Nelson as one of her darkest days.

It was the day gunmen shot and killed her husband, Harry Nelson – a converted gangster who was an evangelist in the Trench Town community.

It was also the day Mrs Nelson became the sole breadwinner of five children, including six-year-old triplets. With all her children being below the age of 12, she was left with the task of raising law-abiding children in the community of Mountain View which was plagued by gang violence at that time.

It was an arduous job, but as her children grew into adults, Mrs. Nelson would live to see what many would call the "supernatural provision of God".

The first act of supernatural provision she experienced was the full payment of her husband's funeral expenses.

"The whole funeral was paid for by a Christian lady named Mrs. Doreen Bramwell. I had no money, but my husband got a king's funeral and I owed nobody. The Trench Town New Testament Church of God also stood beside me over the years. I also remember the time when I got a barrel of goods from overseas. To this day. I have no idea who sent it. But my husband was an evangelist and many people knew him, so after he died, God used Christians of various denominations to assist us," recalled Mrs Nelson, who currently serves as a deaconess in the Trench Town New Testament Church of God.

"There were days when the only thing I could provide for my children was tin food. That was a problem because two of my children are allergic to seafood. I tell no lies when I say during those years of hardship, not one of those kids had an allergic reaction to the seafood. The Lord protected them because it was the only thing I could provide to eat," she said.

She also experienced supernatural provision in the form of volunteers, who mentored her children and offered to pay their tuition fees. God also provided Christian families to house the children during outbreaks of violence in the Mountain View community.

As the Nelson children grew, they saw many families lose their loved ones to violence that plagued the tough inner-city communities of Kingston. Many of their friends – young boys and girls – had their youth swindled by the so-called 'dons' who thrived in East Kingston during that time.

The Nelson children were hardly different from their peers as they, too, had lost a parent to violence. But the children believe their mother's faith made



the difference in their lives. She led by example and lived a life of faith, ensuring that her children attended church and school – in that order.

"We had to go to church, even when we didn't want to. There were nights when we wanted to stay home and study because we had exams the next day. But my mother said we had to go to church and study for the exams afterwards," said Reverend Howard Nelson, the second-born child of the Nelson family.

For Mrs. Nelson, church and school attendance was her way to ensure none of her children got swept up in the violence which surrounded them.

"I taught my children to love the Lord. My children even used to tithe from their lunch money because I taught them to fear God. I felt like that was what God wanted me to do. God loaned me my children and I always saw it as my responsibility to provide for and protect them," Mrs. Nelson said.

That responsibility led her to perform various jobs over the years as she struggled to care for her children.

She was a vendor and she studied cookery, cosmetology and practical nursing. At the same time, she played an active role in their educational careers - an area in which God performed another miracle.

"I remember the oldest triplet had a major learning problem and when I tried to get him into a high school, he was denied a space because he performed poorly on the diagnostic test. I begged the principal, but she said he had a learning disability and there was nothing she could do for him. When I saw the test my son failed, I cried because I realized that he wasn't comprehending as he should have been. That day I went home and crawled under my bed – where I prayed regularly. I asked God to send me some help because I didn't know how to teach children."

Help came shortly in the form of a Christian couple who migrated from the United States to Jamaica, indicating that the Lord had instructed them to open a school here.

They knew the Nelson family and offered to enrol the boys at their school.

"I don't think I paid the first school fees because some people volunteered to pay the fees for the two boys. They went to that school for two years and they got so smart. They then later went to Calabar to finish their high school studies. But do you know what happened to my son that they said had a learning disability? He is a lawyer today and is practising in Antigua and Barbuda. The Lord is not slack concerning His promises."

Today, she is a mother of five successful children, including a fitness coach, an ordained bishop and a lawyer.

"I believe the Lord has given my family a story to draw other people unto him," Reverend Howard Nelson added.

"Through our story, others can know that no matter where you come from or what you have been through, you can overcome it once you put God first. I wouldn't say my siblings and I have achieved everything because I know God has a lot more in store for us." he added.

# Scaffolding CONVERTS

hroughout the New Testament Church of God in Jamaica, February 2022 will be observed as Evangelism Month.

Below we present an excerpt from Dr. Clement Clarke's dissertation in which he examined "The Integration of the New Believers into the Life and Ministry of the Montego Bay New Testament Church of God". We hope you will find this approach useful.

"The reasons for which new believers leave churches are myriad. According to James Cowell, 'A direct correlation exists between a positive congregational climate and the ability to receive new persons.'

He contends that factors that impact climate include the love and acceptance of the membership for each other, the sense of expectancy, trust between pastor and laity, and the congregation's attitude toward change. Cowell posits 10 mistakes that impact a church's

ability to receive and retain members:

Some congregations become self-satisfied. The congregation in this regard, is inward focused, and all activities revolve around the existing church constituents, so that intentional outreach is stymied.

Some congregations
have a poor selfimage. Congregants'
perception of themselves is
so poor that they are afraid to
invite and integrate anyone into
their 'sinking ship'.

3 • ports of entry for visitors. The 'way in' to the church is of particular significance, whether through activities such as sports, round robin dinners, home Bible study groups, or the greeters at church.


5 Some congregations fail to provide any opportunity for structured new member orientation. Congregations that take membership seriously usually provide one or more membership orientation classes' that can take many forms, shapes and sizes.

# Teachers' tales

ithout much prior preparation, since March 2020, most teachers in Jamaica have had to switch from sitting at their desks in their classrooms and engaging their students to entering the homes of their students by way of a computer screen.

In this edition of eREACH, we pose this question to some teachers: "What strategies did you employ in order to cope as you transitioned from face-to-face to online classes?"

Below are their stories in their own words.

# Pressing the reset button

COVID-19 has caused everyone to press the reset button. For me, I had to ensure that, for the most part, my students were coping.

First, I allowed them to express themselves. They stated freely their apprehensions/fears/anxieties. I created the atmosphere for them to share in that vulnerable moment, knowing that they were getting the needed support.

Then I shared with them how I felt and allowed them to know that the transition for me, their teacher, was not easy, but together we could make the strides necessary to do well.

Ground rules were set. They agreed to keep their cameras on so that allowed me to be able to monitor them as best as possible. They had to exercise a lot of discipline, as it was easy to simply turn their cameras off and be engaged in something other than the class activity. As a group, we had to learn to trust each other.

I established a buddy system, where students checked on each other and could account for each other if one did not show up for class.



As the time passed, I also did tech checks, that allowed me to be aware of the devices the children were using, and also those who were without. I submitted the names of those who needed help in sourcing devices to the Welfare Committee for the needed assistance.


# <u>Keeping</u> them engaged

# Learning to navigate a new world
