





# BROTHERS AND SCHOLARS IN CHRIST

Pastors harness faith and friendship to achieve academic success

**T**heir bond may remind you of famous Biblical friends, like the Three Hebrew Boys or King David and Prince Jonathan.

But Drs. Kevin Page, Owayne Frater and Glendon Young prefer to think of themselves as a cord of three strands that is not easily broken.

They became friends in 2004 while pursuing undergraduate studies at the Bethel Bible College of the Caribbean. Since then, they have harnessed their friendship to achieve academic success and have completed similar Bachelor's, Master's and Doctorate degrees during the same years, at the same universities.

Some say they are the first New Testament Church of God (NTCOG) pastors to partner in achieving this scholastic feat, but they say that was not their intention.

“We may be pioneers in undertaking three serious levels of study together. But we simply realised from our Bethel days that we were stronger together. Our collective wisdom produces more, and it would have been a pyrrhic victory if one of us completed our study without the others,” explained Dr. Page, who is the current Youth and Discipleship Director of the NTCOG in Jamaica.

“We helped each other, shared with each other, and at times we lived together on this journey. We aren’t just friends; we are real brothers, so we felt there would have been nothing to celebrate if we didn’t do it together.”

The more than decades-long journey to success ended in May this year, when they each earned a Doctorate degree in Ministry from the United States-based Columbia Theological Seminary. They are pleased with their accomplishment, but are more concerned with inspiring other members of their church to embark on their own educational journeys.

“This is a great achievement for us, but we didn’t do it just for ourselves. We wanted other members

of the New Testament Church to know that the scholastic journey can be accomplished not only if you work hard, but if you also have someone to push you along and hold you accountable,” explained Dr. Young, who is currently aligned with a Pentecostal ministry in North Carolina in the United States.

The brothers said they share a passion for teaching, and are excited that their recently conferred degrees put them a step closer to the classroom. But beyond those ambitions, Dr. Frater believes that higher education will make him a better pastor to the Cave and Whitehouse New

Testament churches in Westmoreland, Jamaica, which he currently leads.

“The calling upon my life has driven me to pursue the highest because I want to be the best I can be at serving in the Kingdom of God. So it’s not about pursuing a degree; it’s about ministry. It’s about pursuing studies at the highest level so you can get a platform to be a courier of the gospel,” Dr. Frater said.

The brothers say they are aware that there are still people who believe Christians should rely more on the Spirit of God and less on formal education. But they say that Scripture shows that God wants Christians to pursue education and develop their skills at the highest level.

“It is a fact that God can use anyone, even uneducated men. There is no doubt about that. But remember Ecclesiastes 10:10, which says more can be done with a sharp axe than a dull one.

“God can do great things with a sharp mind. Look at Paul, who wrote half of the New Testament. He was a brilliant man who spoke many languages. Who had the Spirit of God more than him? Jesus was also a brilliant man who spoke Latin, Greek, Hebrew, and Aramaic. Being an academic doesn’t limit the work of God in your life. It only enhances it,” said Dr. Page.

# LOOKING ahead TO THE NEW CHURCH YEAR



**F**orward Together with Justice and Loving Service' is the theme that will direct the operations of the New Testament Church of God – Jamaica for the church year 2022-2023.

*“Learn to do good, seek justice, correct oppression, bring justice to the fatherless and plead the widow’s cause.”* (Isaiah 1:17) and *“He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you, but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?”* (Micah 6:8) are the key verses that will guide the theme.

#### Special Focus:

Loving Interventions For Transformation (LIFT)

#### WHAT IS LIFT?

LIFT is a ministry framework that sets out to give renewed focus and fresh energy to the incarnational calling of the church. It is an acronym that stands for “Loving Interventions For Transformation”.

LIFT churches, by definition, are “churches that believe that the gospel is, and has always been, a message that is best expressed in both words of love and works of love. Good deeds verify the good news and good news clarifies the good deeds.”

## ▶▶ 'FORWARD TOGETHER WITH JUSTICE AND LOVING SERVICE'

#### OBJECTIVES

- To remind believers that we are called to proclaim the good news of the Kingdom of God and to do good works
- To highlight the importance of service as a means of uplifting the lives of others

## Dr. Wayne Wesley



Dr. Wayne Wesley currently serves as the seventh Registrar and Chief Executive Officer of the Caribbean

Examinations Council. He has spent the last 25 years in human capacity development, spanning education and training, industrial engineering and executive leadership and governance.

He is a Fulbright scholar with a Doctor of Philosophy degree in Industrial Engineering, a Chartered Manager and Fellow of the Chartered Management Institute, UK and a Fellow of the American Society for Quality.

He is a credentialed minister in the New Testament Church of God and a commissioned Justice of the Peace in Jamaica. At present, he serves as Assistant Pastor of the Kingdom Empowerment New Testament Church of God in Barbados, and provides leadership for the Marriage and Couples Ministry. He also serves on the Board of Education and Ministerial Development of the New Testament Church of God in Barbados.

## Mr. Jasford Gabriel

Mr. Jasford Gabriel is an astute professional, with over three decades of experience in teaching at the secondary and adult education levels.

He is acknowledged for service with integrity, his time management and mediation skills, his eye for detail and expansive network of professionals, as well as being a sports enthusiast.

Mr. Gabriel served as President of the Jamaica Teachers' Association (JTA) between 2020 and 2021. Currently, he is a member of the Teachers Services Commission

He has been serving as Principal of Manchester High School for the past 16 years; has been president of the Central Manchester Principals' Association for 13 years; served as Ministry of Education Panel Inspector for eight years, between 2000 and 2008; served as manager

of the Headley Cup and Dacosta Cup Teams for Zone F.

He has been designated Lasco Principal of the Year – Region 5 and First Runner-up. He has been the recipient of the National Award Jamaica Teaching Council/ NCB Excellent Teacher Award; the JTA Award for invaluable contribution to The Manchester Teachers' Association. He is also recipient of the Prime Minister's Medal of Appreciation for Contribution to Education and an Award by Sons of the Father Men's Movement for selfless, dedicated service in the field of education



His qualifications include a Master of Arts Degree in Educational Administration, Post-Graduate Diploma in Leadership, a Bachelor of Science Degree in Economics and Management and a Diploma in Secondary Education

## Rev. Richard Skyers

Rev. Richard Skyers is currently employed to the National Parenting Support Commission, an agency of the Ministry of Education and Youth, in the capacity of Parent Support Manager. In that role he has the remit to implement the National Parenting Support Policy, through oversight of Parenting Programmes, implemented in schools across Region Three.

A past President of the Jamaica Association of Guidance Counsellors in Education, he has over 10 years' experience

as a trained Guidance Counsellor and over 20 years as a Minister of Religion, showing a passion for serving others.



Rev. Skyers' relentless drive for self-improvement has earned him several certifications, among which is a degree in Biblical Studies from the Bethel Bible College. He also holds a degree in Guidance and Counselling from the International University of the Caribbean, post-graduate studies from the College of Agriculture, Science, and Education (CASE), and he is currently pursuing doctoral studies at Bakke Graduate University.

## Dr. Christine Hendricks

Dr. Christine Hendricks is a passionate advocate for the education and empowerment of people with disabilities. She is the current Interim Head of the Jamaica Council for Persons with Disabilities (JCPD), which was established as a statutory body with the Disabilities Act coming into effect on February 14, 2022.

With extensive local and international experience, she has been a vibrant speaker and presenter at workshops and seminars dealing with various aspects of disability. As a member of the community of persons with disabilities, she has lent her considerable expertise and experience to



the advisory and Management Boards on Disabilities and the Abilities Foundation as a Board member.

She has worked with governments, civil society, and systems to facilitate effective inclusive policies, practices and services for people with disabilities. She has also served on several working groups and committees, including the Task Force on the Disability Sub-sector Plan and the Task Force on Social and Vulnerable Groups – both aspects of Jamaica's Vision 2030.

Her commitment to enhancing the total well-being of Jamaica's children is rooted in the church and focuses on the essential ingredients for a sound society – good parenting and healthy marriages.

## Mrs. Kerry-Ann Wellington

Mrs. Kerry-Ann Wellington is the President of the Library and Information Association of Jamaica (LIAJA), a 74-year-old institution whose mission is to “provide leadership in the development, promotion and mobilisation of personnel, institutions and resources in the information field in order to encourage learning and facilitate access to information” within the Jamaican society.

LIAJA's members come from universities and colleges; government ministries and agencies; schools; military and the private sector.

Her substantive post is Head, Instruction Media Service, a division of the Calvin McKain Library, University of Technology, Jamaica, where she supervises technical staff in recording, storing, and providing access to the memory of the University.

She holds a Bachelor of Arts and a Master of Arts in Library and Information Studies from the University of the West Indies, Mona, and a Diploma in Education from the College of Agriculture, Science and Education.



## Mrs. Carmen Johnson

Mrs. Carmen Johnson has spent the last 31 years caring for those who are ill. Most of that time, she has been attached to the St. Ann's Bay Regional Hospital, although she has spent some time as Parish Manager for the Portland Health Services.

For over three decades, she has advocated for quality patient care. Her advocacy led to her selection as the President of the Nurses Association of Jamaica in



2017. She demitted office in October 2020 at the height of the COVID-19 pandemic, which meant she played a crucial role in navigating that difficult phase in the national healthcare system. At the end of her tenure, her colleagues demonstrated their appreciation for her service with an award as President Extraordinaire for the Nurses Association of Jamaica.

She is a member of the St. Ann's Bay Optimist Club and the Violence Prevention Alliance Northeast Chapter, where she participates in health outreach

programmes, doing blood pressure and blood glucose monitoring in various communities.

In the past, she has served as a member of the University Hospital of the West Indies Board of Management; chair of the St. Ann's Bay Regional Hospital Security Council Committee, and on various committees of the Nurses Association of Jamaica. In 2004, she was named the Nurses Association/Lasco Nurse of the Year, and in 2013, the St. Ann's Bay Regional Hospital Employee of the Year.

Mrs. Johnson holds a BSc in Health Service Management and an MSc in Human Resource Development.



## THE STORY OF WARSOP

**F**rom four members four decades ago huddled together in Bobby Uter's shop to mahogany doors, porcelain tiles, French windows, offices and porches – that is the story of the church located at Warsop in the parish of Trelawny.

“God impressed upon the heart of Enid Flowers Smith, along with Sister Isolyn Reid, Brother Leonard Nathan, and Sister Lewis, who were not yet baptised Christians, the need for the establishment of a New Testament Church of God in Warsop.

“Sister Smith acted on this God-inspired desire and wrote to Reverend Samuel Robinson, the then District Overseer for the St. Vincent District of Churches, about their desire for the establishment of a church in Warsop,” said Moniesha Bryan, one of the members, as she reflected on the journey.

Reverend Robinson commended the members on their effort, and made plans to integrate them into the Wirefence New Testament Church.

However, ‘The First Four’ – as those pioneers became known – were not content with this arrangement. They wanted their own building.

“They successfully achieved this objective in 1982, when they purchased the land on which the modern edifice now sits. After the acquisition, they pitched a tent and hosted a crusade with the help of brethren from across the district,” said Bryan.

# FROM ZINKY MINI TO MARBLE FLOORS

Following this crusade, a zinc structure was erected that was nicknamed “zinky mini”. Though the church attracted new members and was filled with the fire of the Holy Spirit, it also came under great opposition because of the style of worship and the view from those within the community that the land was better suited to house a commercial building.

Many community members displayed their dissatisfaction with the existence of the church by ridiculing the members and even going as far as stoning them and the ‘zinky mini,’ said Bryan.

But the members were not deterred.

In the same year of the purchase, ground was broken for the foundation of the building. The members actively played their part, contributing not only their financial resources, but their time and energy. Several members, including women, went into woodlands to collect stones and lumber

to aid in construction. The minister was harshly criticised for building a foundation of that size, given the current membership, but he retorted by saying, “A day will come when we will need it”.

Today, 41 years later and several changes of pastors, each of whom has played his part in moving the church forward, the Warsop Church, which for the past six years has been under the leadership of Reverend Casbert Bryan and was recently dedicated, stands as an example of what prayer, determination and desire can achieve.

# CAMPSITE GETS FACELIFT

When campers arrive at the National Campsite and Retreat Centre in Golden Grove, St. Ann, in July, they will probably not recognise the facilities.

Over the last few months, the administration has undertaken an impressive renovation of the site

to include interior and exterior painting, replacement of doors, redone ceiling, tiling, plumbing and the installation of safety rails.

But that is not the end. Phase two is on its way, when a new dormitory block will be added, the Greathouse will be restored and a multi-purpose

courtyard is to be constructed.

Once those renovations are completed, the facilities will be operational, not only during the summer to accommodate campers, but year-round. It will become a venue for retreats, skills, residential ministry, and missions

training; remedial education, and the hosting of weddings and other events.

Plans are also underway to have the facility become more self-sufficient through agribusiness, rental and other forms of income-generating activities.
