
REVEREND DR. DONALD ROBERTS

The months of July and August this year were abuzz with activities, as, for the first time in more than two years, young people from all over the island gathered at the newly refurbished campsite in St. Ann for Teens and Young People's camps.

Only Children's Camp was held virtually, with an attendance of 520. At the end of that five-day activity, 12 children indicated that they had surrendered their hearts to the Lord.

National Teens Camp followed closely and had an attendance of 350 at the campsite. At the end of

those week-long activities, 39 people were saved and 29 baptised in water.

When August rolled around, the National Young Adults Ministry retreat was ready to take off. When the numbers were counted and after sessions, such as Friday in Berea, Battle of the Sexes, Prayer Room and Tarrying, 285 people were in attendance and 11 were baptised in the Holy Spirit.

COMING SOON

The National Youth and Discipleship Department has organised a series of training sessions during the months of October and November. Those located in the Central Region are invited to the Mandeville Church on October 8; Western Region, October 15 at the Montego Bay Church; Eastern Region on November 5 at the Waltham Park Road Church; and the North Eastern Region on November 5 at the Oracabessa Church.

Those sessions are intended for district and local directors, leaders in the Children's, Teens,



Young Adults, Young Men's and Sports ministries, as well as talent showcase coaches, Christian Education/Sunday School superintendents and teachers, youth presidents, secretaries, and all other leaders and workers of the Youth and Discipleship Department.

WHAT IS LIFT?

LIFT is a ministry framework that sets out to give renewed focus and fresh energy to the

incarnational calling of the church. It is an acronym that stands for 'Loving Interventions For Transformation'.

LIFT churches, by definition, are "churches that believe that the gospel is, and has always been, a message that is best expressed in both words of love and works of love. Good deeds verify the good news and good news clarifies the good deeds."

- a means of uplifting the lives of others To encourage every local church to engage

YOU ARE A THEOLOGIAN

A ll Christians are theologians. Theology is not an obscure indulgence reserved for special people. This field of study is a skill that all believers need to hone to address issues of practical Christian living. While some believers are eager to accept their ministry gifts, many are confused when they hear the word 'theologian' and tend to believe that only pastors belong to that select group.

peuteronomy 1412 YOU HAVE BEEN GELAPART E CADART E CADART FOR HIS PURPOSE This article is intended to inspire Christians to become more deliberate about matters of theological reflections and to embrace the fact that once they are followers of Christ, they are theologians.

Theology is a way of thinking about life from a Christian perspective. It is important to realise that theological reflection involves a measure of *"embedded understanding"*.

That expression points to all we understand about God and His purposes through the message of the church. One's embedded understanding improves when he or she assimilates the message of the faith through sermons, study of the Word, worship, personal devotions, and in conversations with other believers.

Our embedded understanding, comprising our insights and beliefs about the Christian faith, shapes our *embedded theology*. All Christians have – and use – embedded theology. According to authors Howard Stone and James Duke, embedded theology *"is deeply in place and at work, as we live our lives in our homes, churches, and the world,"* (*How To Think Theologically*, 2013, 15).

Our embedded theology informs the decisions we make about work, family and career.

Embedded theology is what we have in mind when we say things like, "the Word of God is my guide". It is our secure and passionately held convictions of the Christian faith.

We seldom question embedded theology. However, there are times when we may experience a real-life crisis that may force us to ask questions such as "Why did this happen to me?" or "Why didn't God stop COVID-19 from spreading around the world?"

When we begin to question and reflect on our cherished convictions, we are engaging in what is called *deliberative theology*, which occurs when we reflect on our deepest convictions. Deliberative theology may help to inspire our faith in God and enable the formation of new convictions.

'FAITH SEEKING UNDERSTANDING'

Saint Anselm of Canterbury is best known for his motto: "Faith seeking understanding". By that statement, Anselm did not mean he intends to replace faith with understanding.

Stone and Duke spell out the idea of faith seeking understanding: "As Christians, we are called to pursue growth in faith – by relearning and reinforcing what we already understand faith to be and by expanding, deepening, and even correcting our initial understanding of the faith." (2013, 26).

In other words, deliberative theology brings our God-given gift of reason into the service of faith.

The theological task is an act of faith and a token of love for God. Our Lord Jesus, in what is called the Great Command, instructs us to "*love the Lord with all our mind*". (Matt. 22:37).

That means we must take pleasure in theological reflection. Such deliberate and "full-breadth reasoning" is a way of loving God with our minds. However, loving God with our mind takes skill and robust reflection on biblical faith. How then does faith seek understanding? What is involved in the process of deliberative theology? We seek understanding and fashion theology through the activities of interpreting, correlating, and assessing the faith. We are all relentless interpreters. We are always seeking to know the meaning of things; that is what interpretation means.

As followers of Christ, we aim to interpret the meaning of things from the perspective of the Christian faith. That is how we should seek to live as believers. We also fashion theology through the activity of correlating. At its

core, correlating means we seek compatibility or distinctiveness between ideas.

In this activity, we raise questions such as "How does the Christian faith overlap with other worldviews?" "Is there a relationship between Creationism and Evolutionary Darwinism?" The task of theology involves making a connection between the Christian faith and the world around us.

Further, theology is a way of assessing the rational

or trustworthiness of 'truth claims'. The business of assessing helps us to decide what is valid, appropriate, intelligible, and grounded in the right ethical standards for Christian sensitivities. God calls us to formulate and express theology in a manner that serves the Christian faith.

For theological reflection to be of service to our faith, we need to harness the skills of interpretation, correlation, and assessment. Those skills should become habitual attitudes. The whole point of theology is to help us understand and apply the meaning of God's message to the realities around us.

It is important that you seriously commit to the calling to practise deliberative theology, and make that activity your life's mission. We need to listen and question, connect the dots, and carefully decide on what we will accept as faith convictions. This is a call to practise – not just to state – traditional beliefs, which need to be corrected.

Each generation has to make sense of biblical faith. It will take the efforts of scholars, pastors, and all believers to achieve that ideal, a call to all Christians to aim to become deliberative theologians.

CONVENTION 2022 TELLING ITAS ITIS

n an effort to obtain the views of delegates to Convention 2022, we conducted a survey among our pastors and members. The sample size was 389 and the number of respondents was 342 – a response rate of 87%. The overwhelming majority, 86%, had a positive view of Convention 2022, believing that the sessions were planned, organised and executed well.

Just over one-third -38% – of the respondents worshipped with us online, while 33 per cent were in the physical space, and 29% indicated that they participated using both modalities.

Some 76% of the respondents were members and

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24% were pastors. Seventy-three per cent (73%) were female and 27% male. One per cent (1%) of the respondents fell in the under-18 age range, and 19% were in the 19-35 group. The largest percentage of respondents were between 36 and 55 -49% – followed by the 56 and over age cohort, with 31%.

The participants in the survey gave the sessions an average rating of 84%, and 86% of the respondents said they believed that the sermons were well-received.
