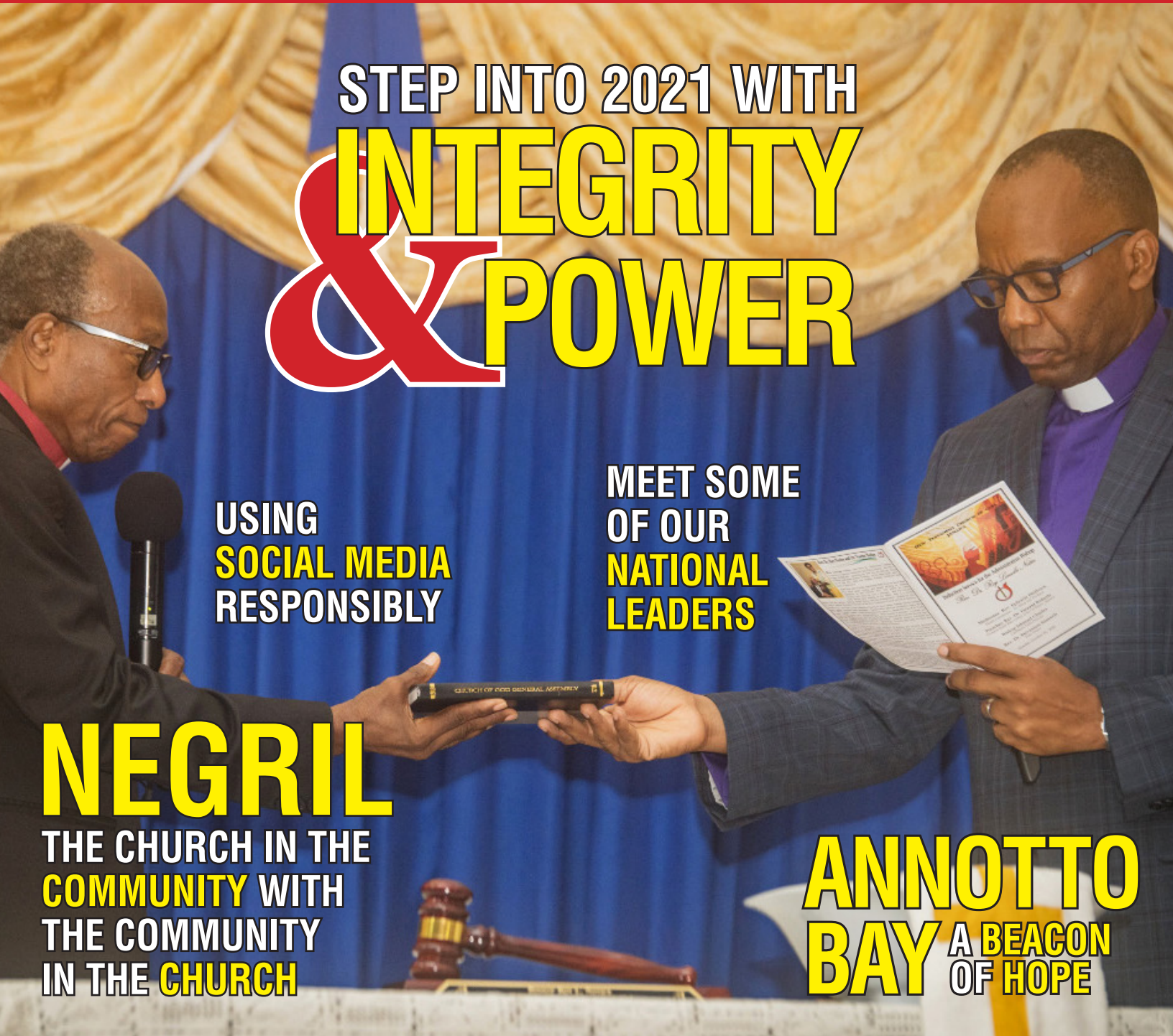

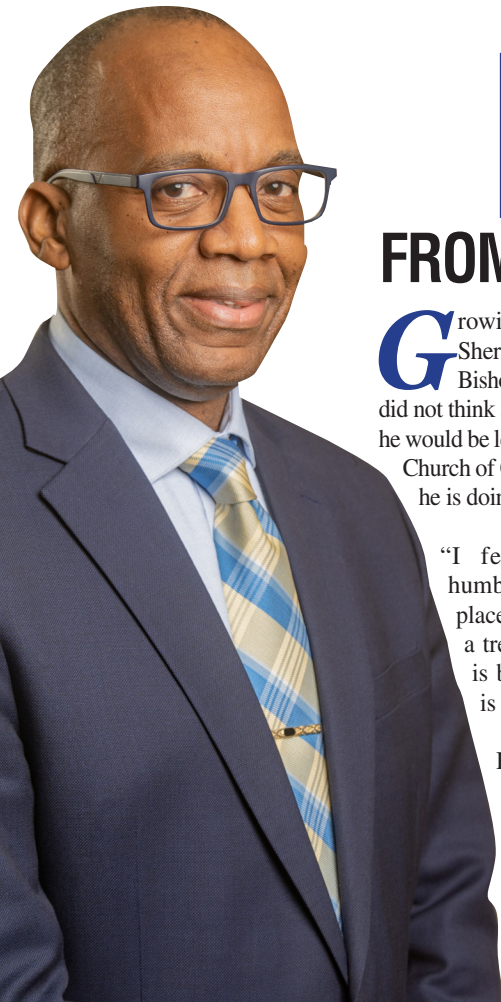

FROM SHERWOOD CONTENT TO FAIRWAY AVENUE

Growing up in the hills of Sherwood Content, Trelawny, Bishop Dr. Roy Notice probably did not think about the fact that one day he would be leading the New Testament Church of God in Jamaica, but today, he is doing just that.

“I felt overwhelmed and humbled that my colleagues placed confidence in me. It is a tremendous task. The task is bigger than me, but God is able,” he says.

He is a man who millennials would refer to as ‘PK’ (Pastor’s Kid) as he has followed in the footsteps of his now-retired father, Rev. Raymoth Notice, and

his late uncles, James Notice and Dr. Guy S. Notice, who served as National Overseer of the denomination.

Bishop Notice attended the William Knibb and Calabar High Schools, the University of the West Indies, Mona and the United Theological College of the West Indies (UTC), where he read for a Master’s degree in Theology. He also holds a Doctor of Ministry degree from the Columbia Theological Seminary of Atlanta and UTC.

Prior to the current appointment, Rev. Notice served as Youth Pastor of the Portmore Church and Senior Pastor at the McDonald Lane, Mandeville, Old Harbour and Waltham Park Road churches. He has also served as National Director of Youth and Christian Education as it was called then, as a member of the National Executive Committee and

President of Bethel Bible College.

As Administrative Bishop, he has a number of items on his agenda regarding the development of the denomination.

“The idea of the healthy church is at the forefront of my mind, in my spirit and in my heart. I want to lead the church so that our pastors and lay leaders can develop congregations that are strong, balanced and effective, dealing with issues like evangelism, discipleship, biblical stewardship, deep fellowship, sustained prayer, vibrant worship. I want to ensure that our congregations are healthy,” he says.

For the past 26 years, Bishop Notice has been sharing his life and ministry with Dr. Vinette Notice, and the couple has two children, Danielle and Joelle.

Dr Vinette **NOTICE** ‘IT’S ALL ABOUT SERVICE’

If millennials refer to Bishop Dr. Roy Notice as ‘PK’ (Pastor’s Kid), then they would refer to his wife of 26 years, Dr. Vinette Notice, as ‘CK’ (Church Kid).

Dr. Notice was only 10-years-old when she became a Christian, and it was at the Portmore New Testament Church of God in St. Catherine that she honed her talents as choir member, youth leader, Family Training Hour president, Sunday School teacher and Women’s Ministries worker.

The latter role is serving her well since she assumed responsibilities as the National Women’s Ministries President in September, 2020.

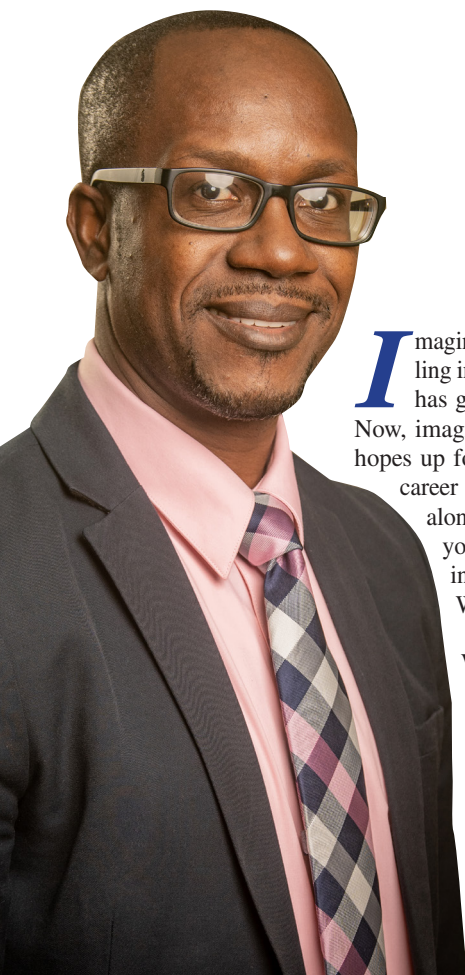
“It’s all about service, being accessible to the women, to provide support, to cry and laugh with them, to prepare leaders, to build teams, to develop the next generation and keep women interested in ministry,” she says of her new role.

A Kingstonian, Dr. Notice attended The Queen’s and Wolmer’s Girls’ schools. She read for her Bachelor and Master of Science degrees in Accounting at the University of the West Indies, Mona, and doctoral studies in Business Administration at the University of Phoenix, Arizona.

She currently serves as Assistant Vice-President of Credit Risk Management at First Global Bank.

PASSIONATE ABOUT YOUTH

Imagine working with and excelling in a company that seemingly has great plans for your future. Now, imagine that after getting your hopes up for what may be your next career move and you are walking along the beach one day when you clearly hear the Lord telling you to go to Bible school. What would you do?

What Reverend Kevin Page did was to answer that call.

The National Director of Youth and Discipleship was quickly climbing the corporate ladder when he received that call and says he knew he had only one choice: He had to shed the trappings of

corporate life and say, “Yes, Lord”.

After completing his studies at Bethel Bible College of the Caribbean, Jamaica in Mandeville, Manchester, where he was described by his lecturers and peers as an exceptional scholar, he headed for the Jamaica Theological Seminary, the Caribbean Graduate School of Theology and the United Theological College of the West Indies (UTC) in Kingston. He is currently pursuing doctoral studies at the Columbia Theological Seminary at UTC.

Rev. Page’s pastoral journey has taken him to the Battersea, Morant Bay, Rousseau Road and the McDonald Lane churches.

The St. Mary native brings passion and vibrancy to his new portfolio as he has always had a keen interest in the growth

and development of young people.

“I believe with a strong youth department, we can have a strong church. As a result, my major focus is to strengthen our local youth departments. I want to ensure they have all the tools that they need to help their growth. This includes training, being on the ground with them and providing all the support they will need,” he says.

Rev. Page is widely regarded in church circles as the “athletic pastor” as he is an avid footballer, and wherever he serves, he would leave the church with a football team of worth.

For the past nine years, Rev. Page has been sharing his life and ministry with Racquel, and the couple has two children, Gabrielle and Joshua.

Rev Orville PLUMMER

UP TO THE TASK

Reverend Orville Plummer brings to the office of Secretary-Treasurer, years of experience that he honed from the Glenmuir High School in Clarendon to his current doctoral studies at the Delaware State University.

In between those two extremes, he has read for the Bachelor of Arts degree in Theology, with a Minor in Guidance and Counselling, at the Jamaica Theological Seminary, and Master’s degree in Educational Administration at the University of the West Indies, Mona.

His pastoral journey, over the last 26 years, has seen him moving from Haddo in Westmoreland, Ramble in Hanover, Mountain View and Sterling Castle in

St. Andrew and Porus in Manchester to Old Harbour and Central Village in St. Catherine.

At the national level, Rev. Plummer has served as Teens’ Ministry Director, Camp Ministries Director, Lecturer at Bethel Bible College, Youth and Christian Education Director, Director of Ministerial Care and Development and a member of the Executive Council.

As Secretary-Treasurer, he is under no illusions about the enormity of the task.

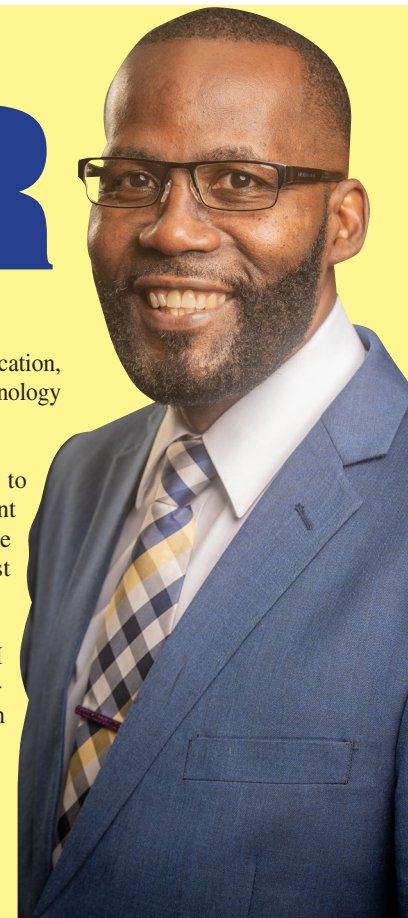
“It is a very expansive role that sees me in charge of a number of key areas like administration, financial and legal matters, property and asset management

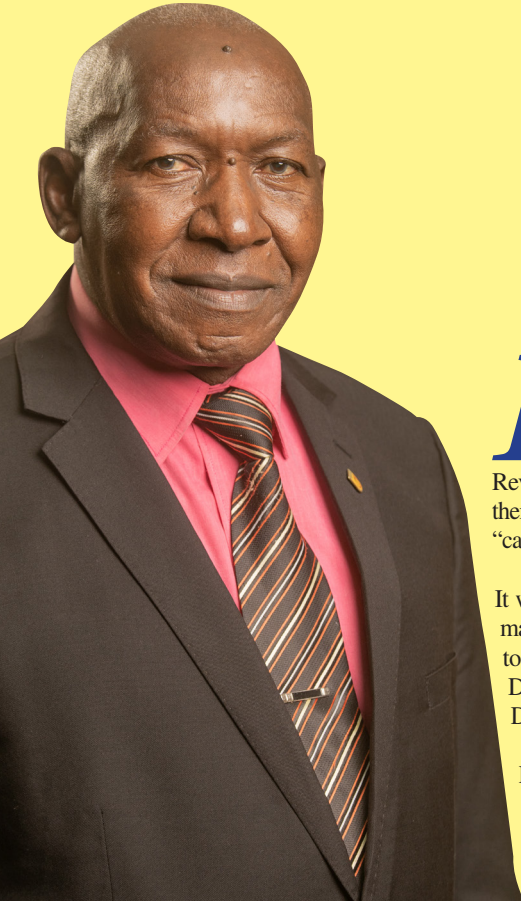
issues, some amount of communication, and now we’re building out a technology type of outfit,” he says.

Rev Alexander **SIMMS** CALLED TO SERVE

If you should ask members of the New Testament Church of God in Jamaica to use one word to describe Rev. Alexander Simms, many of them would probably respond with “caring”.

It was, therefore, not surprising for many when he was recently called to serve in the role of National Director of Ministerial Care and Development.

Prior to being appointed to that position, Rev. Simms served as pastor of the Eleven

Milles, Broadgate, Braeton, Middle Quarters, Oracabessa, Galina, Mango Valley, Linstead, Port Antonio, Spring Bank and Eastwood Park Road churches. His pastoral ministry spans 41 years. He also served as a member of the National Executive Committee.

Rev. Simms says he is excited about this new position, as he is happiest when he is taking care of the needs of people.

“This is an important role. It has to do with the well-being of those called to serve and it has to do with

their development, so it gives me great joy to be tasked with this responsibility,” he says.

In his current portfolio, he is required to focus on continuing education for ministers, handling the needs of retired ill or incapacitated ministers, as well as deal with the affairs of deceased ministers.

Rev. Simms has been married to Linisha Simms for almost 50 years, and they have two biological daughters, a grandson, a granddaughter, and numerous adopted children and grandchildren.

This group would be members of the Annotto Bay New Testament Church of God.

Since the onset of the coronavirus pandemic (COVID-19), members of the congregation, led by Rev. Carla Service White, have been packaging the message of salvation in what they refer to as a creative and unique fashion.

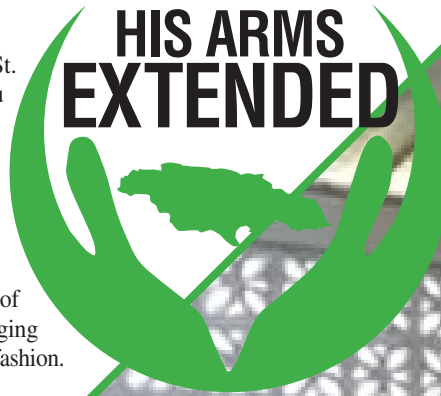
The group has visited the Annotto Bay Hospital, the male ward in particular, and has conducted devotional activities.

Additionally, they have handed out care packages, along with masks and gospel tracts, to people within the community.

Recently, they have embarked on a 'pampers drive' to donate adult diapers to patients at the hospital, many of whom have no relatives to care for them.

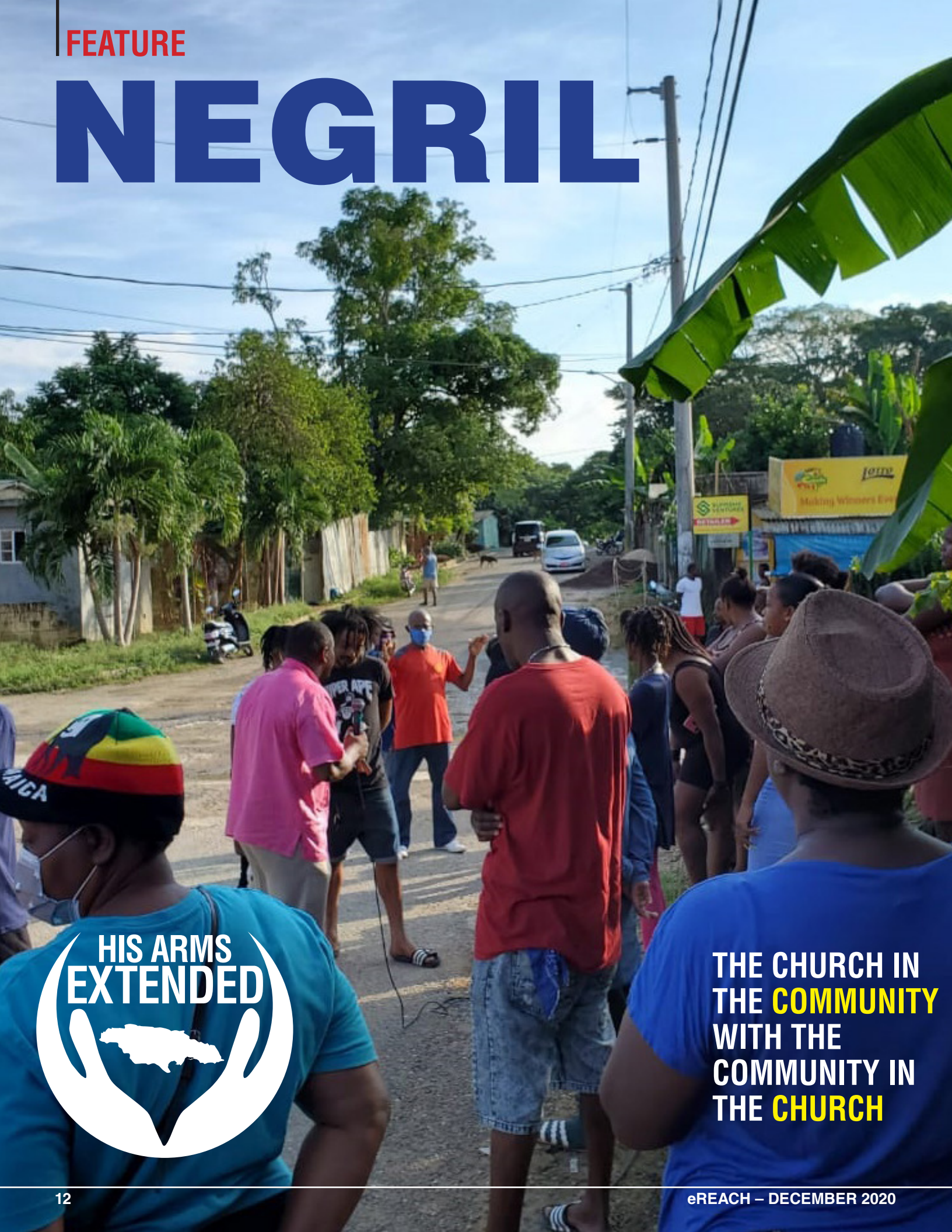
The next project on their calendar is a garage sale aimed at raising funds to purchase cellphones for some of the older congregants to enable them to log on to the online services.

How would you feel knowing your wedding day was not just bringing joy to you, but to many other people in need of help?

“Fantastic” is apparently what engaged couples at the Negril New Testament Church of God in Westmoreland are saying.

Over the last nine months, proceeds from any income received by the Church from expenses associated with conducting their nuptials go toward assisting those who are unable to provide for their basic needs.

“We had a lot of members who were employed in the tourism industry. When COVID hit, they lost their jobs, so now we take care of them,” says Reverend Rudolph Grant, pastor of the Church.

Prior to the problems brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic, the Church had an outreach programme that provided food items to the needy and shut-ins. Today, that project has been transformed into a mini food bank that provides, free of charge, rice, flour, canned foods, cooking oil and various seasonings to the congregation.

“We have a church brother who raises pigs. We buy one every month and two cases of sliced fish for those who don’t eat pork and some chicken parts,” says Rev. Grant. “The aim is to ensure any person



who walks through our Church and does not have the means to cook can go home and do so.”

In addition, the Church is paying the examination fees for several students who will be writing the Caribbean Secondary Education Certificate (CSEC) tests this year but are unable to meet those financial obligations. Contributions toward this effort come from several sources.

“My brother sends me US\$200 every month. Members overseas also send us money and every dollar that I get from weddings is used to fund the projects,” says Rev. Grant.

He says the Church has been able to lend a helping hand even in the face of declining membership. At the start of the pandemic, he had 400 congregants, but today, that number has decreased to between 250 and 300. At the same time, Rev. Grant and his team are redoubling their efforts in bringing the Gospel to the community.

“On Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays we go out at 6:00 a.m. to different locations on the street. We sing, testify and share the Word,” he says. He further explains that in order to reach others, he uses WhatsApp and text-messaging services.

Currently, the Church has no tagline, but should he decide on one, it would be, “Negril, the Church in the community with the community in the Church”.





For this issue of E-Reach, we bring you the first in a three-part series setting out some guidelines for using social media.

These guidelines apply to all online and mobile platforms that are used for sharing content, whether controlled by The New Testament Church of God in Jamaica or hosted by others, on which members engage in discussions or activities related to the denomination or affiliate organisations.

The term ‘social media’ refers to social-networking services, blogs, short-message services, message boards, wikis, podcasts, image- and video-sharing sites, and other methods of real-time information- sharing. This is a constantly evolving area, so these guidelines also apply to all new social media platforms.

USING SOCIAL MEDIA *responsibly*

GENERAL GUIDELINES

- If you wouldn't be comfortable having a post shared in the church bulletin or on the front page of a newspaper, then do not post it online.
- Avoid using profane or vulgar language in posts.
- Do not share anything about upcoming events regarding the church unless it has already been posted online by those with responsibility for disseminating this information.
- Refrain from posting anything regarding an individual's health, hospitalisation, or other personal circumstances, without that person's written permission.
- Do not post specific prayer requests without the individual's written permission.
- Take complex or sensitive discussions offline.

COMMUNICATING WITH MINORS

- Ensure you have parental consent before collecting and disseminating children's personal information, such as a name, address, telephone number, or their image.
- Do not send or accept a 'friend request' from a child without parental consent.
- Do not post photos of minors on any social media channel without consent from their parents.
- Do not tag children on social media without the consent of their parents.

NOTE WELL

For posts involving children (0-17) participating in Sunday School, Teens' Ministry, Children's Ministry, Youth Camp, Boys and Girls' Clubs, etc., parents must be asked to sign a consent form for use of the child's likeness or image in promotion of the department or group.
