POSITIONED FOR PURPOSE

“I distinctly heard the voice of the Lord three years ago saying, ‘I am bringing you into something new,’” recalls Jasford Gabriel, President of the Jamaica Teachers’ Association (JTA).

At that time, says Gabriel, becoming President of the JTA was not on his “to-do list”.

“I was approached about whether I would consider running for the JTA presidency. I prayed about it and the Lord gave me a word that I should go up and possess the land. I accepted the challenge and was nominated.”

However, as it is normal for nominees to go through certain processes, such as being part of the District or Parish Associations or serve on committees at the national level, Gabriel’s nomination was not without opposition as he was not a part of the traditional processes.

“I was undaunted by that. The Lord provided me with the resources and some quality people to be a part of my campaign team. I saw so much of God’s favour on the whole journey,” Gabriel says.

Though he didn’t realise that this was what the Lord meant by bringing him into something new, he is embracing his new role.

“I believe it is a good place to impact education and to raise the professional bar in education while seeking to look about the well-being and welfare of our teachers and students,” he says.

His journey began at the Kilsyth Primary School in Clarendon before he matriculated to the Edwin Allen High School in Frankfield. While that school is popular for its track and field athletes, Gabriel says he was an

ardent student, skillful cricketer and an enthusiastic preacher.

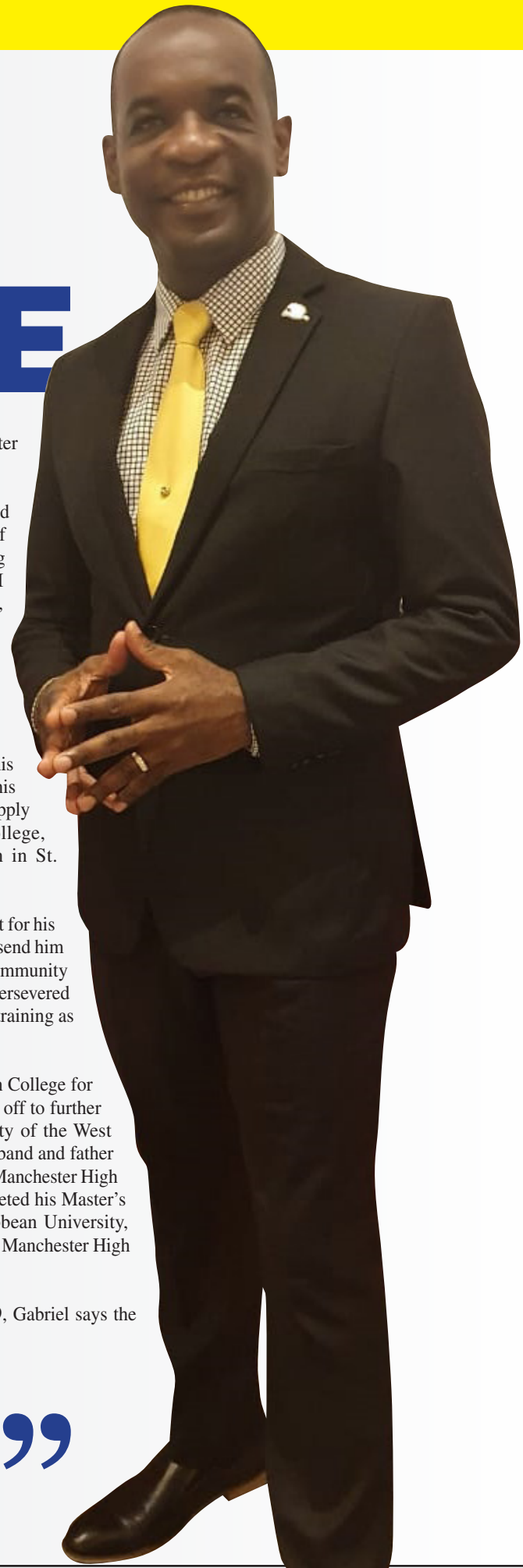
“People always thought I would have been a preacher as one of my favourite pastimes growing up was preaching the gospel. I would be preaching in my yard, in the woodlands and even when I would be carrying home the animals from the bush, I would just be preaching to everything,” he says.

But as he neared the end of his secondary school life, one of his teachers encouraged him to apply to Bethlehem Moravian College, a teacher-training institution in St. Elizabeth, and he did.

Gabriel recalls it being difficult for his parents, who only managed to send him to school after a benevolent community member offered to assist. He persevered and was able to complete this training as a teacher.

His first stint was at Clarendon College for four years before he took time off to further his education at the University of the West Indies. Following this, the husband and father of two daughters moved on to Manchester High School. While there, he completed his Master’s Degree at the Northern Caribbean University, and was appointed Principal of Manchester High in May 2006.

With the advent of COVID-19, Gabriel says the

educational landscape has changed; hence, some of his main objectives include pushing technology and promoting digital transformation. He acknowledges that these tasks are not easy, but he believes the Lord will give him all the tools he needs to be successful.

"Where the Lord leads, He provides and equips," he says.

Gabriel may not have ended up in the pastorate, but he still uses every opportunity he gets to share the Word of the Lord. He currently sits on the church and pastor's council at the Mandeville New Testament Church of God in Manchester.

He says he is grateful for his wife, Sharon, his daughters Shara and Amanda, and other family members and friends who have supported him at every step of his journey.

NEW UNITS, BROADER VISION

At the beginning of the 2020/2021 Church Year, the leadership announced the establishment of several new or restructured units in an effort to strengthen aspects of the denomination. Below, we introduce you to the units and the leaders.

DISCIPLESHIP UNIT

“Discipleship isn’t a programme or an event; it’s a way of life. It’s not for a limited time, but for our whole life. Discipleship isn’t for beginners alone; it’s for all believers for every day of their life. Discipleship isn’t just one of the things the church does; it is what the church does,” wrote Bill Hull, in his book, **The Complete Book of Discipleship: On Being and Making Followers of Christ.**

A careful reading of the commands of Jesus to his

disciples before His death and after His resurrection suggests that disciple-making is the central mission of the church, as indicated in Matthew 28:19-20.

“Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age.”

In its thrust to become ‘A

Kingdom-advancing, Bible-based, Christ-centred, Spirit-filled, Disciple-making, Family-focused church, positively impacting people and the nation’ as its mission indicates, the New Testament Church of God has implemented a national unit dedicated to this role.

To that end, Bishop Dr. Ajilon Ferdinand has been appointed National Discipleship Coordinator, with responsibility for strengthening Sunday School, Converts Care, Bible Study, training for lay leaders.

NATIONAL PRAYER NETWORK UNIT

Without sustained, intentional, consistent and Spirit-led praying, the church becomes powerless.

That was the thinking behind the newly established National Prayer Network. This entity will be responsible for promoting prayer as an

integral part of the life of the denomination.

This newly formed unit, headed by the Reverend Joseph Green, will be encouraging activities such as prayer vigils, prayer crusades, all-night prayer and prayer watches. The ministry will be mobilised to support events such as conventions, camps, congress and crusades.

NATIONAL MUSIC AND WORSHIP UNIT

One of the features of a healthy church is a Music and Worship Ministry that is vibrant, Christ-centred and Spirit-driven.

The church, therefore, has to be intentional in strengthening and broadening its music and worship ministry, through strong and committed leadership. The formation of the Music and Worship Unit is in-keeping with that goal.

This Unit, headed by Mrs. Andrea Roberts, will

provide the vision, leadership, organisation and management required to develop and implement a balanced, dynamic and effective approach to worship.

The Unit has been directed to provide ongoing training and capacity building for those involved in the ministry, with a view to improving the worship experience of our members and visitors. The team will also provide support to national events, such as crusades, conventions and other special services.

REGIONAL EVANGELISM AND MISSIONS UNIT

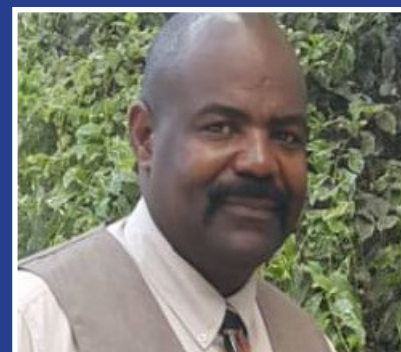
“In order to be more effective, efficient and geographically-focused, the New Testament Church of God has implemented a regional structure to drive evangelism and mission,” reads the Terms of Reference for this Unit.

“The Great Commission cannot be made small if the church is to remain true to its discipleship mandate. Reaching out with the Gospel of the Kingdom is an indispensable calling that the church must faithfully and enthusiastically respond to in all seasons,” it continues, thereby confirming the need for a restructured Unit.

Cornwall, Middlesex and Surrey, have been designated as the three geographical regions, and each will be led by a Regional Director.

GROWING CHURCHES SEEK HELP

More than four decades after the voice of the church fell silent in an area called Wrong Turn in the Guy’s Inn area of Annotto Bay, St. Mary, Hallelujahs began ringing out again on Sunday mornings.

Those sounds heralded the establishment of the Annotto Bay New Testament Church of God in recent times.

This church was born out of a national tent crusade in 2010. It took another eight years for this fledgling congregation to be formalised, and it is now an active church in the area, catering to the needs of the community and beyond.

But the journey to ‘Wrong Turn’, a name that the members are advocating should be changed to ‘Right Turn’, has not been easy.

The members began holding services in the Community Centre, then they had to move to the All-Age School. When COVID-19 hit, it became logistically impossible for them to continue holding services at

the school, so they moved to another area on the premises. There was to be one more move and that took them to their current location.

It is a location that is rife for evangelism. Most of the residents are young people, who spend a lot of their time smoking marijuana, some members say, and the murder rate is rising, with double and triple murders becoming the order of the day.

It is in that atmosphere that under the leadership of the Reverend Carla Service White that the members are anxious to make a difference. But they are calling for help.

“We are urgently in need of a tent, a restroom and a storage area to

store equipment and furniture. To date, we have begun work on the foundation for the restroom and storage area as well as established a reed bed. As we move forward, we urge our brothers and sisters to join in prayer and support this move ... in raising funds to assist in making this a reality for the Annotto Bay community,” says Rev. White.

Another branch of the denomination that could benefit from support of individuals or groups is Ewarton, which is situated on the Linstead District of Churches.

Established 20 years ago, the members currently worship in a dilapidated building. They are working hard to change their current

reality, and in recent times, despite the COVID-19 pandemic, have been seeing an uptick in attendance.

The building project commenced in January of this year and the members are in the process of preparing the land for the erection of the new structure, which will include a sanctuary, as well as homework and skills training centres.

MANDEVILLE

CREATIVELY BENEVOLENT

If benevolence had a face, it would look like the Mandeville New Testament Church of God, or so it seems.

“We have a major benevolent ministry at Mandeville that covers about six or seven different arms. It is actually eight arms, the first of which is Manna House,” says Reverend Dr. Osbourne Fisher.

Manna House provides food to needy households each month and COVID-19 has not affected those efforts.

“Every month, we distribute 80 to 100 food packages to needy people. That we do like every third Monday. Along with that, we have another 40 to 50 packages for people who just walk in,” he tells eREACH.

Another ministry is called Feeding Tree. This arm provides meals for at least 30 homeless people twice per month.

“This is done by the Men’s Ministry and the Women’s Ministry every third and fourth Sunday,” says Rev. Fisher.

Then there is CURE – Community Upliftment Relief and Education Fund. This arm is designed to provide financial support for basic expenses, such as rent, utility bills, medical bills and medication, tuition fees, lunch and transportation for school.



In addition, the church operates what it refers to as a revolving loan scheme, where members may access short-term financial assistance as the needs arise.

The KARE Ministry provides back-to-school supplies for students, including stationery, note and text books and bags.

“Like September and January, you find that we distribute 100 to 120 packages,” says Rev. Fisher.

“Currently, because of COVID-19, we are seeking to provide tablets for the children and along with that, KARE Ministry is providing Internet for the children to come (to the church premises) – those who don’t have Internet at home.”

There is also a Scholarship Fund and what is referred to as Government Information Centre and

Empowerment Ministry (GIC), which provides information on how members may access state benefits.

“They interface with PATH, NHT, NIS. We have them come to church and run seminars. They seek to bring the benefits from government to the people at church,” Rev. Fisher explains.

The ‘Empowerment’ aspect of that ministry provides psychological support to community members who are facing challenges.

“They (the members) are very proud about their church and they are very supportive, so whatever project they take on, they do it. And they give of their time, their talent and their resources,” Rev. Fisher says.

The pastor of this 36-year-old church credits the success of the many ministries that the church is able to operate to the commitment of the members to prayer and fasting.

“There is fasting every Wednesday, prayer every Tuesday and Saturday, and every three months, the church engages in a three to four-day fast. There is a tremendous emphasis on prayer and fasting. You could say it’s in the DNA of the church,” he says.

FASTING FAITHFULLY AND SAFELY

The goal of fasting is to draw nearer to God. Biblical fasting always involves eliminating distractions for a spiritual purpose; it hits the reset button of our souls, and renews us from the inside out. It also enables us to celebrate the goodness and mercy of God, and prepares our hearts for all the things God desires to bring into our lives.

Your personal fast should present a level of challenge, but it is especially important to know your body, your options, and importantly, to seek God in prayer and follow what the Holy Spirit leads you to do.

Fasting while suffering from chronic illnesses may be challenging, but not impossible, so it is always advisable to consult your physician, if you are taking prescription medications.

TYPES OF FAST

The ‘Daniel Fast’ is a partial fast. In Daniel Chapter One, the prophet ate vegetables and drank water. “Please test your servants for 10 days and let them give us vegetables to eat and water to drink” (Daniel 1:12). If you would like to embark on this type of fast, please note that you should limit your intake to fruits and vegetables, and you should eliminate sweetened beverages and consume only water.

Other types of partial fasts could include giving up one meal and replacing that time with prayer; fasting for a part of the day, for example, skipping breakfast, lunch or dinner. When engaging in this type of partial fast, you should consider your work and sleep schedule. The hours that you sleep should not be considered part of your fasting period.

Along with fasting from food, you may also consider a media-use-for-pleasure fast. Technology is interfering with time spent in prayer and the Word, so giving up the gadgets for a period of time is a good way to carve out protected time with the Lord.

PRACTICAL GUIDELINES FOR FASTING

How long you fast is entirely up to you, the plan of your church and the leading of the Holy Spirit. The Bible gives examples of fasts;

- one day or part of a day (Judges 20:26; 1 Samuel 7:6; 2 Samuel 1:12; 3:35; Nehemiah 9:1; Jeremiah 36:6)
- one-night fast (Daniel 6:18–24)
- three-day fast (Esther 4:16; Acts 9:9)
- seven-day fast (1 Samuel 31:13; 2 Samuel 12:16–23)
- 14-day fast (Acts 27:33–34)
- 21-day fast (Daniel 10:3–13)
- 40-day fast (Deuteronomy 9:9; 1 Kings 19:8; Matthew 4:2)
- fast of unspecified length of time (Matthew 9:14; Luke 2:37; Acts 13:2; 14:23).

There is strong biblical evidence that fasting draws us closer to God. We also know from scripture that some situations will never change unless prayer and fasting are applied.



Guidelines for social media managers

In the first issue of eREACH, we gave you some general guidelines for interfacing with social media platforms, as well as some specific rules when dealing with minors. In this second instalment, we speak to those charged with managing the social media accounts of local churches.

Inappropriate posts may expose the church to risks associated with defamation, liability and copyright infringement. Material that is uploaded to the Internet is never 100 per cent secure.

IMPORTANT GUIDELINES

- The church's social media platforms may be used to communicate information about upcoming sermons, series of events; links to audio/video of recent sermons; updates on the progress of church programmes; outreach activities or to share Bible verses and devotional guides.
- Be sure to keep posts relatable to your various publics – church members, visitors, non-Christians
- While social media platforms should be monitored daily, try not to overwhelm your audience with myriads posts each day.
- Endeavour to respond to questions raised on the social media platforms within 48 hours.
- Handling negative comments or heated discussions may be tricky. Be polite; do not respond when you are upset, refer the situation to a church leader. Do not be afraid to seek guidance.
- Online harassment, threats to an individual's safety, threats against the church, or accusations against the church should be reported immediately to the pastor or other church leaders.
- Inappropriate matter includes, but is not limited to, profanity, sexual content, excessive alcohol usage and illegal drugs. In the event that any of this content is posted on the church's social media pages, it must be removed immediately, and an apology that distances the church from such content posted.
- In using a scheduling tool for upcoming posts, it must be possible to quickly pause the tool if there is an emergency or national/international situation that would make posting such items seem insensitive.

GROUP GUIDELINES

- Churches are allowed to create and administer Facebook, Instagram, YouTube and Twitter accounts. However, administrators should provide content for the national pages as well.
- Administration of those accounts must be controlled by a member of the church with training and skills in the various programmes, and one who demonstrates maturity and sound Christian principles.
- Under no circumstance should those platforms be used for bullying, profanity, posting embarrassing content or defaming the Church of God.

PREVENTING COPYRIGHT INFRINGEMENT

Here are five tips to avoid copyright infringement on social media:

1. Receive permission. The best way to utilise copyrighted content is by seeking the author's permission.
2. Use images from public domains. It is always ideal to use images from sites that have no copyright restrictions
3. Give credit.
4. Review ownership rights.
5. Consider purchasing content.
