HISTORY ON THE HORIZON

EXCITING TIMES AHEAD AS CENTENNIAL CELEBRATIONS PICK UP

few months ago, I participated in a regional Journalism Summit at The University of the West Indies in Kingston, Jamaica. There were some 70 participants physically present, and another 200 people from across the world were online. One of the presenters from Suriname, in making the point about the advances in artificial intelligence (AI) and the impact on journalism, showed a video clip of two newscasts, one in which the anchor was artificially generated and another where she was a "real" person.

To our consternation – in a room filled with journalism lecturers, media managers, senior journalists, and journalism students – it was impossible for most people to tell the difference between the two clips, which had the presenters similarly attired. Needless to say, that presentation generated robust discussion on the future of journalism and ethical considerations in the use of AI, and how rapidly this invention is evolving.

Of course, just being involved in that event caused me to reflect on the relevance, timeliness, and appropriateness of the theme for our Centennial Christian Academic Conference (CCAC) scheduled for August 8-9, 2025 at the Montego Bay Conference Centre in Jamaica.

The theme for that conference is 'Redemptive Reset: The I Am, The AI and Christian Scholarship for the Empowerment of Community and the Future'. In essence, Christian academics, members of the clergy, graduate students, and everyone who has an interest in

the topic – and that includes all Christians – will gather to interrogate this issue of when the AI meets the I AM.

We are excited to be exploring that topic. The call for abstracts has been circulated and you will see further information on that activity within the inside pages of this publication.

Of course, the conference is only one of a slew of activities that have been planned to celebrate this once-in-a lifetime event. You will receive snippets of each activity on the inside pages of this edition, as well. Please spread the word and let us all plan to be a part of history and support all the activities, all being well.

As you would have guessed by now, this issue is-all about our centennial; however, we also have the Administrative Bishop's New Year's message and updates on activities that took place over the last three months – and believe me, there were many – as well as some initiatives aimed at the continued development of our members.

Then, on Sunday, January 12, at 6:00 p.m., our official launch service will be held at one of our branches that holds so many fond

memories for many of the stalwarts of this denomination, think annual national conventions, head office ...

That service will be one of thanksgiving, reflection, singing, recalling of history and the word by our guest preacher, Bishop R.C. Hugh Nelson. His remarkable story is summarised in the article that follows.

We invite all churches to plan to be represented as together we create memories and make history.



THE CENTENNIAL LAUNCH SERVICE SPEAKER

t was the great playwright William Shakespeare, who, in one of his many works, penned the words: "Some are born great, some achieve greatness, and some have greatness thrust upon them."

In a conversation with Bishop Dr. R.C. Hugh Nelson, he would probably be the first to tell you that he was not born great, neither did he have greatness thrust upon him, but he has had to work hard for what he has achieved.

And what he has achieved is academic excellence and service to humanity that is simply mind-boggling.

He is described by those who know him as a man of God, committed to a ministry of restoration that reaches beyond the sanctuary to uplift those most in need.

"I was born on the beautiful island of Jamaica, the third of five children to the late Reverend Vernon N. Nelson and Eva Nelson," he would quickly say to anyone who wishes to know more about his antecedents.

Bishop Nelson migrated to London, England, as a young adult and pursued undergraduate studies in Theology at the European Bible Seminary in Rudersburg, Germany, and Biblical

Archaeological studies at the Institute of Holy Land Studies in Israel.

He later earned a Master's degree in Divinity from the Pentecostal Theological Seminary in Cleveland, Tennessee; and advanced certification in Community Service Chaplaincy and advanced certification in Clinical Pastoral Education at the Emory University Hospital in Atlanta, Georgia,

And he did not stop there. His voracious appetite for learning led him to become certified in conflict resolution at Saint Paul University in Ottawa, Canada, and a Master's Degree in Non-profit Executive Leadership from Fordham University



in New York. He then completed his Doctor in Ministry degree at the New York Theological Seminary.

Prior to pursuing full-time pastoral ministry, he was employed as a psychotherapist at the Hiwassee Mental Health Center in Cleveland, Tennessee, where he helped develop the Crisis Response Program, which focused solely on suicidal patients. In October 1994, Bishop Nelson and his family moved to Ottawa, Canada, where they remained for eight and a half years.

During that time he served as Senior Pastor of the Ottawa Church of God; District Overseer for the Ottawa District of Churches; Chaplaincy Coordinator for Ontario; Co-chair for the Community and Police Action Committee; President for the Samaritan Support Services of Ottawa-Carleton; Executive board member for Church of God in Ontario; Executive board member for Church of God in Canada; a guest workshop presenter at the Ontario Police Academy; member of the Church of God International Publication Board; member of the Church of God Board of Education; and the Church of God Division of Care.

And there was more to come.

In 2003, he and his family relocated to Brooklyn, New York, where he currently serves as Senior Pastor for Ebenezer Urban Ministry Center, formerly known as Church of God of East Flatbush; District Administrative Bishop for District #2; President for Hope Center Development Corporation Inc.; and member of the New York State Executive Council.

He also serves on the Board of Trustees for One Brooklyn Hospital, and 2nd Vice president to the 67th Precinct Clergy Council (Godsquad). Bishop Nelson was elected to the Church of God International Executive Council of 18 at the 78th International General Assembly in 2022 and re-elected to the Executive Council of 18 at the 79th. International General Assembly.

Additionally, he serves on several other international boards, such as People For Care



and Learning in Cambodia, Freedom Outreach International Ministries and the European Theological Seminary in Kniebis, Germany. He also provides spiritual covering to the pastors and staff of Set The Captives Free Outreach Center in Windsor Mill, Maryland.

In recognition of his outstanding contribution to community development and transformation, he received the New York United Hospital

Fund Distinguished Trustee Award in 2009 and the Brookdale Hospital Medal and Plaque in 2011.

He was awarded Alumnus of the Year by the European Theological Seminary in Kniebis, Germany, and

> in December 2020, recognised as Alumnus of the Year by the Pentecostal Theological Seminary in Cleveland, Tennessee

"Bishop Nelson is a visionary whose guidance and focus on leadership development enabled the Ebenezer Urban Ministry Center to evolve from a single cell church model into a vibrant urban ministry centre that is home to more than 1,700 members and ministers to over 2,500 on a weekly basis," is what is written about him.

In 2011, Bishop Nelson led his congregation in the purchase of two city blocks for the development of the Ebenezer Plaza, which provides a 43,000 square footage Urban Ministry Center and over 500 affordable apartments.

In 2021, the Big Apple Brownfield Award for innovative remediation was presented to the Ebenezer Plaza Owner LLC. and the New York City Housing Partnership Innovative Project award on October 23, 2024.

Ebenezer Urban Ministry Center functions as a vibrant ministry hub that operates on four pillars: a Worship Center, Hope Center Development Corporation, Urban Reach NYC and a Migrant Waiting Center.

Serving alongside him are his wife, Reverend Diana Nelson, to whom he has been married for 38 years, and their three children, Raphael Jr, Andrea, and Sigourey, as well as his daughters-in-law, Janissi and Ayisha, and his grandson, Maverick.




BACK TO WHERE IT ALL BEGAN One hundred years ago, this denomination held its first service as an organised body in the hills of a remote rural area

EVERY HOME FOR CHRIST

very Home for Christ (EHC) is a 76-year-old international missions-based organisation with headquarters in Colorado Springs, United States of America, and currently does ministry in some 155 countries.

Its vision is that every person on earth would have a genuine opportunity to respond to the truth and love of Jesus.

The Jamaican chapter, led by Reverend Dr. Orville Plummer, provides training and free resources in the areas of prayer, evangelism, discipleship, Christian education, children's ministries, mentorship, leadership, and humanitarian aid.

EHC commenced its operations in Jamaica with a four-month pilot that involved the New Testament Church of God, the Church of God of Prophecy, the Open Bible Standard Churches, the Missionary Church Association of Jamaica, and the Church of God in Jamaica.

Since its establishment over three months ago, the ministry has engaged 141 churches; trained 1,400 people; distributed 100,000 tracts; reached 4,454 homes; and ministered to 12,740 people in public places.

Additionally, just under 17,000 people have been reached through events, 79 baptised in water, 53 put in touch with a local church, and 238 Bibles have been distributed.

The next initiative will see the EHC partnering

with the National Youth and Discipleship Department of the New Testament Church of God in training and certifying over 2,000 teenagers in the John Maxwell Lead Today programme.
